## Talking About Climate Change....

In the last issue we talked about the National Audubon's latest climate change report, *Survival by Degrees*. Since then the conversations surrounding climate change have only continued to amp up in the media and across the web. So... How can you, or me or someone else make a personal impact?

Well, we're happy to say that National Audubon has launched its Guide to Climate Action. Which summarizes a variety of ways to get involved in what they've broken into four steps:

- Start the conversation
- Lead your community
- Rebuild the machinery
- Join a National Cause

Each topic includes a helpful and detailed explanation along with additional links to explore further. Suggestions range anywhere from creating climate friendly yards (remember

## Bird of the Quarter

If you haven't seen a cardinal before keep your eyes peeled, the vivid red colors of the male make them particularly easy to spot in the snow. Females also stand out but sport a softer palate of light brown with red accents on their wings.

They enjoy most bird seeds but seem to find sunflower seeds a favorite. And can most often be spotted in wooden areas or in shrubs.

As a supplement to National Audubon's climate change we thought it might be helpful to remind you of all the small and local ways to get involved:

- Attend events with us or other partners to learn more about our specific area, native plant and animal species and how they interact.
- Look for volunteer/work opportunities to further expand your horizons.
- Use your <u>Audubon</u> and <u>eBird</u> apps to continue helping gather centralized data for the teams who analyze and use the information to make further predictions. (Click the links to learn about the apps!)
- Check out the <u>New York Audubon</u> site for opportunities to lobby for legislation.
- Stay in touch on social media. Follow organizations which peak your interest or align with your values to stay informed and involved.
- Keep an eye out on events hosted by local colleges and schools for other ways to help.
- Go green in your own home by shopping conscientiously and carefully, reuse and recycle where you can and aim to waste as little as possible.

#### **ASCR Bald Eagle Nest Watch Program**

We are looking for volunteers for the 2019-2020 season.

- If you like getting outside and observing wildlife, this could be the volunteer opportunity you've been looking for.
- ♦ Volunteers only need to commit to spending at least 1 hour per week observing an assigned nest, and submitting a report on that nest.

2018-2019 was a great year for the ASCR Bald Eagle Nest Watch program!

- 12 volunteers helped watch 12 Bald Eagle Nests throughout the area.
- More than 92 hours of observations were recorded.
- Most of the nests were reported to have fledged at least one Eaglet.
  - Many nests fledged two Eaglets.
  - ♦ One nest did fail no young were raised.
  - Trees obscured another, creating difficulties with observing.






